Post from the Pulpit

As I ...

... sit down a few days before Easter to cobble together an article for the April newsletter, I am well aware that the clock is running! And I'm not talking about the clock that runs when tall athletes run up and down the court in fairly short pants, hoping to be playing basketball in April for all the marbles. No, no. I'm talking about the clock that is running out on my tenure as your interim pastor. My clock is about to run out. For most basketball teams in the Big Dance, time has already expired. My alma mater, Michigan State, got bounced out long ago; if you're a Wisconsin grad, yours did, too. I would be hard-pressed to name the teams, men's as well as women's, that hoisted trophies a year ago, but I'm sure I was glued to the telly at the time. I will be glued to the church Easter Sunday when we affirm and experience the joy of the resurrection. And there may be moments when I will be overcome by the joy of it all! I've never been hesitant, even as a card-carrying male, to express my emotions.

Over the nearly 18 months that we have been together as pastor and people, I have mentioned the name Fred Buechner. Fred's gone now, but, along the way, he authored a bunch of books on the Christian faith and life. It's common for people like me to quote people like him. As it turns out, most rock-solid, earnest, in-church-often Christians find it difficult to read articles and books about the Christian faith and life. I can understand why. Many of those books are written by academics for other academics, not for normal people like us. Many of us prefer to settle in with a juicy English novel or mystery, but Buechner's an exception to the rule. His books are actually comprehensible. In one of his books, for example, Buechner says, "Faith begins with a lump in the throat." On Easter Sunday, I expect to have an occasional "... lump in the throat." Joy does that to you. It causes emotion to bubble up in the throat, making it difficult to sing and speak.

Recently, I preached a sermon in praise of men who are able to express emotion publicly. In a prior life, this was discouraged. Like those Brits over there beyond the water, we men know the virtue of a "stiff upper lip!" "But the times," as Bobby Dylan once wrote, "they are a-changin." Finally,

after years of hard work, some of us men have come to realize it's alright to let it all hang out, alright to express emotions, especially joy.

I anticipate experiencing some joy as some of us gather on the front lawn of the church on Easter morning for a "sunrise" service. We're going to miss the sunrise by a few hours, but never mind. There will be some joy floating around. Some are convinced that outdoor services are literally "for the birds." After all, it's argued, there's no organ out there, no sound system, often no heat! According to the morning paper, it's going to be a little nippy out there at 8:00 this coming Sunday morning. Even so, that's God's temple out there! Out there it's possible to hear birds singing, possible to see flower buds trying their best to show up and trees trying to leaf out; it's possible to feel, if not the warmth of the sun, at least the warmth that comes when friends and loved ones huddle in a circle and sing, "Christ, the Lord, is risen today." To do that is an occasion of joy, an occasion that carries at least the potential of a " ... lump in the throat."

It occurs to me that joy has always been one of the hallmarks of my ministry. No surprise there. When the apostle Paul got around to writing a letter to the Galatians, he named "the fruits of the Spirit" (Galatians 5.22). Guess what? "Joy" is #2 on the list, right after "love." According to Paul, joy is a major deal, a major ingredient of the Christian life. To miss the joy is to miss one of the major consequences of living the Christian life. If there's no joy in it for you, something ain't right. To make sure all of us experience this God-given, God-intended joy, and before the clock runs completely out, let me tell you why I love being a pastor and teacher of the United Church of Christ.

Over the course of my career, I have known the joy of PROVIDING PASTORAL CARE. Ordained pastors have the privilege of standing with God's people in time of "trial and rejoicing," as it says in the UCC Statement of Faith. A spiritual guide must be an attentive listener and spiritually confident, whether in the living room, the hospital room, the funeral home, the coffee shop. Such occasions provide the basis of trust. Without trust, essential, necessary conversations will not take place. Such conversations evoke a shared willingness to open oneself to the leading of the Spirit through prayer and the gifts of the Spirit, to open oneself to that which is of God.

In public settings, primarily in the company of the gathered community of faith, pastors lift up the word of God as revealed in scripture TO BUILD THE COMMUNITY OF FAITH. There's joy in doing that. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 4, we pastors are encouraged "… to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ." Building that "body" represents a bit of a challenge, given the current drift of the wider culture away from the church, but, when it happens, there's joy in it. This "drift" began in the late Sixties when it was discovered that the Baby Boomers (those born between 1946 - '64) were not showing up in church, generally speaking. The Boomers (now 60 - 78 years of age) were the first generation to find other things to do on Sunday mornings. That means their kids and grandkids are not in church either, generally speaking. Books have been written to explain why this is so; fortunately for Mickey, who has to cram all this into our April newsletter, I don't have space in this article to indicate why this is so.

What I know is that there's joy in chipping away at the task of building the body of Christ. When I showed up back in the fall of 2022, it was clear this needed to be done. The church had been through a tough time. A shot of continuity and stability was needed. For the past 18 months or so, we've been working on that together. I'm probably not totally objective about this, but it seems we've made some progress in this regard. And there's been joy ... at least from my side of the table.

Strong communities of faith then become instruments of outreach and mission. And there's joy in this, too, the joy of being involved in PUBLIC MINISTRY AND MISSION. As I'm sure we all realize, it just feels good ... to do good. As I have said routinely, I see a bunch of "good" going out the door of our church. Routinely, we're running food to our local food pantry; we're running stuff down to St. Ben's in Milwaukee ... or out to Grafton with Mr. Bob's for our homeless brothers and sisters ... or supporting our homebound friends ... or knitting prayer shawls. The list goes on. That's public ministry, in case you were wondering. In addition, we are a 5 x 5 church! That means we support our denomination (through OCWM - it's in our budget), as well as all the special offerings of the UCC (and there are 4 of them).

Each church, no matter the size, exists for mission. It's our life-blood. It quickens the heart in a good way! It gets the blood running. It touches the soul. Energized by the example of Jesus, we reach out as a church to those in need. We reach out first ... and ask questions later. Having read the parable of the Good Samaritan, we know that my neighbor is anyone in need. We get that! And, because we get that, we know the joy that comes in reaching out and extending God's love to those who need us. As we do that ... joy!

Over the past 18 months, I have known the joy of serving as interim pastor of the church. I have known the joy that comes in being a pastor, in building the community of faith, in being involved in mission. My hope and prayer for your new permanent pastor is that she, too, working harmoniously with all of you, will know the same joy, the same
